

EDISON INTERNATIONAL
CORPORATE POLITICAL CONTRIBUTION POLICY
(Issued May 1, 2010)

Elected officials and ballot measures can have a large impact upon Edison International (“EIX”) and its subsidiaries, Southern California Edison (“SCE”) and Edison Mission Group (“EMG”), and upon our customers, shareholders and employees. Accordingly, the EIX companies exercise their responsibility to actively participate in the political process by supporting and opposing candidates for public office and ballot measures.

As part of such support and opposition, the EIX companies may from time to time make political contributions to candidates, political parties and political action committees. We may also make contributions to independent expenditure committees, or make direct expenditures to support or oppose candidates, so long as the expenditures are not made in cooperation or consultation with, or at the request of, any candidate. It is our policy that all such contributions or expenditures will reflect company interests and not those of individual officers or directors.

Legal Requirements

Campaign finance laws are complex and often require compliance with detailed and strict disclosure requirements, sometimes within 24 hours of making a contribution. The EIX companies will only make political contributions that comply with the law and that adhere to the EIX Ethics and Compliance Code. Employees will not be reimbursed directly or through compensation increases for personal political contributions or expenses, and the EIX companies will not pressure or coerce employees to make personal political expenditures or take any retaliatory action against employees who do not.

Federal election laws prohibit corporations and labor unions from making political contributions to federal candidates and national political parties. However, federal law allows corporations to form political action committees (“PACs”) funded by voluntary contributions from employees, shareholders and their families. Such committees can make contributions to candidates for federal office. Under this authority, EIX has formed the Edison International PAC (“EIPAC”), which makes such contributions. Our federal PAC files monthly reports that are available from the Federal Election Commission (“FEC”).

A number of states and municipalities, including California and Illinois, allow the use of company funds to make contributions to state and local candidates for public office and to political parties. Other states, such as Pennsylvania, prohibit such practices. From time to time, Edison International Civic Action Committee

("EICAC"), a California small contributor committee funded by employee contributions, may make contributions to state or local candidates in jurisdictions where corporate contributions are prohibited or restricted. We may also use company funds to participate in support of or in opposition to various ballot measures. In California, information about campaign contributions made by the EIX companies is available from the Office of California's Secretary of State.

In addition to Edison International PAC's federal campaign contributions and other permitted company contributions made to state candidates, the EIX companies may make expenditures to support or oppose candidates, so long as the expenditures are not made in cooperation or consultation with, or at the request of, any candidate.

Because of the complexity of political contribution laws, the EIX companies have in place procedures, including consultation with counsel as appropriate, to assure that corporate political contributions are made in compliance with applicable laws and will be timely reported.

Approval Process

EIX authorizes an annual political contribution budget that is administered by the EIX Public Affairs department as part of its operational budget. Events may dictate making contributions that are not included in the annual budget process. For example, vacancies may occur in public offices giving rise to unanticipated special elections; there may be changes in legislative or congressional committees overseeing business matters in which the EIX companies have an interest; and ballot measures may qualify for voter approval after the budget has been prepared. In such instances, the Executive Vice President of Public Affairs may approve additional expenditures. The EIX political contribution budget does not include contributions by EIPAC, or by EICAC, which are funded by voluntary contributions from employees, shareholders and their families.

All political contributions made by the EIX companies, EIPAC or EICAC must be approved by an applicable Vice President, Executive Vice President, and in some cases by the Chief Executive Officer and Board of Directors. In certain instances, multiple approvals are required before a contribution may be made. The following table shows approvals required for all political contributions (including EIPAC and EICAC contributions):

Contribution Level	Required Approval
≤ \$25,000	Vice President of Public Affairs of SCE or EMG, as applicable, <i>or</i> EIX Executive Vice President of Public Affairs
> \$25,000 and ≤ \$50,000	Vice President of Public Affairs of SCE or EMG, as applicable, <i>and</i> EIX Executive Vice President of Public Affairs
> \$50,000 and ≤ \$1,000,000	All of the following: EIX Executive Vice President of Public Affairs, EIX Chief Executive Officer, and, <i>as applicable</i> , the CEO of SCE or EMG.
> \$1,000,000	Board of Directors or an authorized committee thereof

Board of Directors Oversight

No less frequently than semi-annually, the Board of Directors, or a duly authorized oversight committee, such as the Audit Committee, will receive and review a written report listing all contributions for the specified period and EIX political contribution policies.

Disclosure

EIX's Corporate Political Contribution Policy, as it may be revised from time to time, will be posted on the EIX website. Contributions made by the EIX companies to candidates in California can be found online at: <http://cal-access.sos.ca.gov/>. A detailed listing of EIPAC contributions to federal candidates can be found online at: www.fec.gov. Contributions to state and local candidates where EIX companies do business can be found on the websites of the election boards of those states. The website links for Illinois and Pennsylvania are attached below. Finally, EIX will request trade associations that receive total payments of \$50,000 or more from EIX companies in any calendar year to report to EIX what portion of such dues or payments were used for political contributions that, if made directly by the EIX companies, would not be deductible under section 162(e)(1)(B) of the Internal Revenue Code. The information received will be disclosed on the EIX website.
